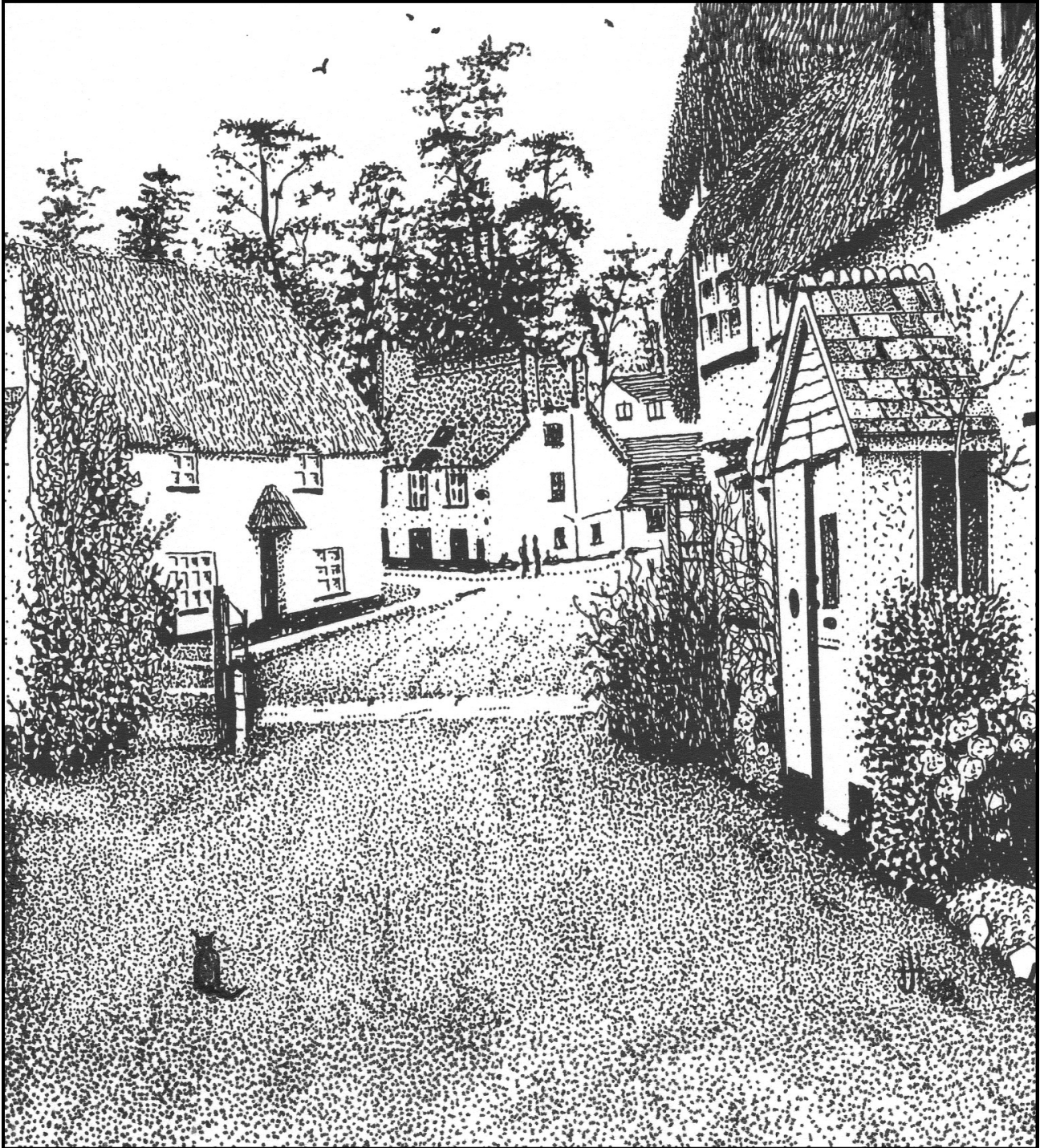

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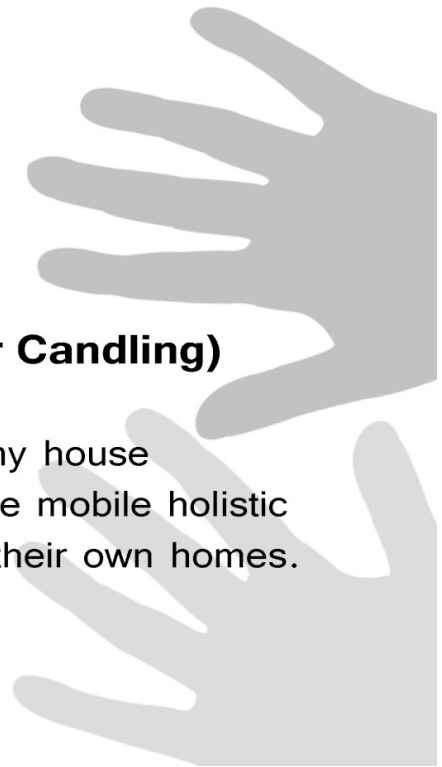
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RECREATION GROUND CLUB.

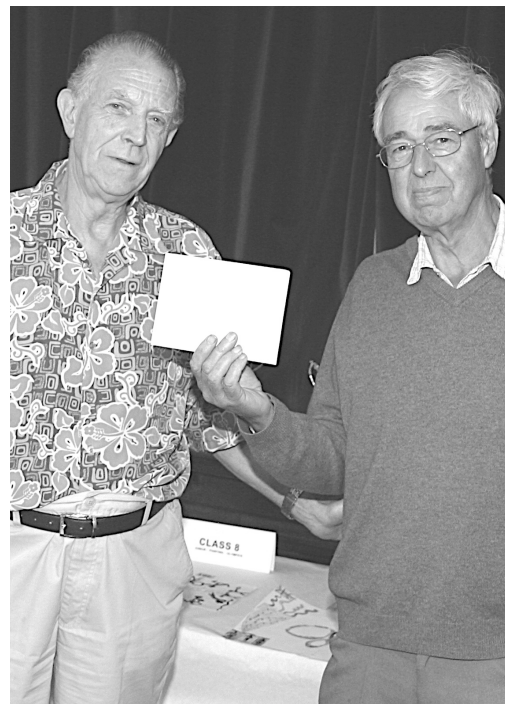

OCTOBER 1972

The lay-by at Tytheing Close had been approved.
Improvements to the pavement at Half Moon and the drainage work was under way.

Poles for the lighting were going up in Station Road.

The new Chairman for the Parish Council was Sid Gratton and Mrs Hazel Down was elected Vice Chairman.

Anne Ayre joined the Newton Wonder editorial team.

At the School the old Alcon stoves were being replaced by thermostat controlled heaters burning North Sea Gas so hopefully there would be no more fumes to contend with.

At the W I meeting Mrs Dawe talked about using old plastic bottles, boxes etc.

OCTOBER 1982

A Harvest Festival had been held in Cowley Church.

A cheque for £660 was presented to Exeter Hospicecare as a result of the Walkabout.

The Parish Council planted spring bulbs on the village green

An accident between a car and a coach on School Hill resulted in the police and the air ambulance being called.

The Vicarage had been put up for sale but had failed to reach the reserve price of £58,000 at auction.

Mrs Harris spoke at the W I meeting on Value for Money including best buys at Sainsbury's.

OCTOBER 1992

It was reported that there would be more trains from Newton St Cyres. To Exeter: 8.09; 8.53; 12.33; 14.38 & 17.10. From Exeter: 8.54; 11.33; 14.03; 16.43; 17.30 & 18.21. To Barnstaple: 9.16 & 17.43. From Barnstaple: 7.15 & 16.18.

Free car parking is provided at the Recreation Ground.

The Parish Council were reminding everyone that permission was required to put signs up on the village green.

There was a long Police report this month which indicated that most crimes in the village were car related and generally crime was low.

OCTOBER 2002

Mark Bailey reported on his visit to Rwanda to help to build shelters.

A party was being held for Reg Bray to celebrate his 100th birthday.

The Parish Hall were advertising for a new Treasurer as Sandy Fleming was retiring after 9 years in the post.

Recipe for this month.

Chocolate cinnamon cake with damson cream filling

225g butter
225g caster sugar
4 medium eggs
175g self-raising flour
1 tsp baking powder
50g cocoa powder
1 tsp cinnamon
Half of 265g jar of damson preserve
150ml double cream, whipped
Extra cocoa for dusting

Preheat the oven to 180C, gas mark 4. Place butter, sugar and eggs in large mixing bowl. Sift in flour, baking powder, cocoa and cinnamon and beat thoroughly. Spoon into 2 greased and base-lined round 20cm sandwich tins and level the surface.

Bake for 30 minutes until well risen. Turn out and cool on wire rack. Sandwich the two cakes together with the damson jam and whipped cream and dust with cocoa.

Parish Council report September 6th meeting

Best Kept Village results

The Councillors were delighted to hear the results of the Best Kept Village in Devon competition for 2012 and to learn that **Newton St Cyres** had been judged the best large village! The judges called us a **gem** of a village and were enthusiastic about the sense of community involvement in everything they saw. They made comments about the well kept properties, the gardens and the wildflowers in the hedgerows, the immaculate village green, the tidy and cared for car park, the neat and tidy School and Parish Hall, the beautiful and well cared for Arboretum, the tidy Recreation Ground and Station, the two excellent pubs and well stocked village shop.

The judges noted that the village had taken note of their comments in 2011 and the flag on the Church and the tidy churchyard and Recreation Ground had special mention.

The map had been produced by Cllr Roger Cashmore and this was considered to be a wonderful help with detail that made navigation easy. The judge's final paragraph states: **"Newton St Cyres Parish Council and many members of this active community are to be congratulated on maintaining such high standards in all aspects of what makes a 'Best Kept Village'. It really is 'doing the best with what it has', in terms of the private and public buildings, the amenities, the environment, conservation and is striving to maintain a dynamic and cohesive community. It justly deserves to win the Large Village category 2012."**Our score was 94 points out of 100.

We have been asked to arrange a date for a presentation to be made to the village of a shield, a framed certificate, a traditional road sign and Mole Valley Farmers vouchers.

The Presentation will be held at the Mini Market on Saturday 27th October in the Parish Hall. Everyone is invited to come along and see the presentation and join in the celebration of a major achievement. Well done, Newton St Cyres residents!

Lindsey McClean and Jane Fletcher-Peters from the Environment Agency came to talk to the Parish Council about implementing a Flood Plan for the village and the Council agreed to identify a working party to meet with the Environment Agency to implement this. The Council felt this would be a sensible approach as there are various areas in the village which have

been identified as being vulnerable in the event of storms or heavy rain. More details will be advertised very shortly.

Police report for August: Calls to the Police – 2 x concern for welfare; 1 x vehicle stolen; 1 x RTC (Five Elm); 1 x Abandon (child on line); 1 x Domestic related; 1 x possible abandoned vehicle. Crimes reported were: 1 x Domestic related and 1 x Theft of vehicle.

The Council learned that the proposed Planning Application for 2 houses at 2 New Estate had been withdrawn.

New dropped curbs had been installed by the School and at the entrance to Court Orchard and a new section of pavement laid on the station side of Court Orchard entrance.

The Council agreed to re-write the Welcome Pack for newcomers to the village and this will now be printed and distributed to Councillors so they can welcome newcomers to their road or area.

All in all this was a very positive meeting. Our next meeting will be held on **Thursday 4th October in the Clubroom of the Parish Hall**. The meeting will start at 7.00 pm as we have Jonathan Guscott, Planning Officer for Mid Devon District Council coming to speak to us about the new Planning Regulations.

This will be followed by the business meeting at 7.30 pm and everyone is very welcome to come to hear Jonathan and pose questions and queries.

Neighbourhood Health Watch initial meeting

Some 20 people gathered in the Crown & Sceptre pub on Thursday 13th September to hear from Jayne Clarke of the PCT and to learn about the pilots for the Neighbourhood Health Watch that are already in existence.

Jayne explained that this initiative came out of a concern for the welfare of vulnerable people during the bad winter of 2010/11 and was started by a consultant and his GP wife in Budleigh Salterton. Jayne explained that this could be very informal and was really going back to the days when communities helped each other in times of need.

Two representatives of the local police were at the meeting and support had been offered by the Doctors' surgeries in Crediton.

Ideas of ways in which this might work in Newton St Cyres came from the people present and included ideas such as:

- Regular coffee mornings could be held in the Crown & Sceptre to act a social get-together and a sharing of concerns
- A co-ordinator could be identified who would keep a list of willing volunteers who would help out with delivering prescriptions, feeding pets, simple gardening, acting as company on short walks, visiting lonely people etc. etc.
- An internet café could be established and simple instructions on the use of computers could be given to those in need. The computer would be available for use when the only means of communication for vital services is through email.
- It should be emphasised that this group of volunteers would not act as an 'out of hours emergency service' but would fulfil a need in the community.

The meeting agreed to come back again with more ideas for the way forward on **Saturday 13th October at 10.30 am in the Crown & Sceptre. Anyone who is interested in helping their neighbours or anyone who feels they would like to be able to benefit from this initiative are invited to come along on the 13th and enjoy the coffee and cupcakes and learn more about the ideas.**

OCTOBER ON THE FARM

I pretend it's not happening until autumn is right on top of us. The unstoppable, overwhelming green tide of growth turns round and meekly disappears into the ground. We get a fiery display as the leaves drain of green, going out in a blaze of glory. Let's hope for more of the glowing light of September to give October that incandescent quality. The wet, cold summer gave extraordinary growth to cool country plants, and things that need warmth suffered. Less insects - the cows never got besieged with flies - meant all those insect-eating birds did not thrive. A friend said most of her first hatch of swallows died, the second hatch stayed late, hoping to fatten up on early autumn flies. They've gone now, and the skies are quiet. The difficult summer for insects seems to have made the wild boar niggly; so many slugs to eat would make anyone grumpy. A neighbour phoned, concerned that the wild boar were chasing the fallow deer. I'm not so upset; the deer were looking excessively comfy in Coldharbour Field: even two herds, one of twenty and one of thirty; it's a lot of extra mouths for our farm to feed when we want to build up the grass to feed cows deep into the winter.

CROPS - the summer gave little warmth to swell the grain. Our winter's stores have a lot of thin, shrivelled grain in them. The maize crop harvested last month was half the height, with poor grain set. Grain around the world was affected by heat or cold. Our winter stores are looking light, although we have a lot of grass in store and still standing in the field. I've feeling fortunate we don't feed much grain to our cows, and very fortunate that we don't have grain eating creatures like chickens or pigs. Many farmers have barns less full than we would like. The torrent of straw lorries travelling from the east of the country to the west show we are all gearing up to feed straw to eke out the silage. That will take extra grain to top up, which will be expensive.

We are drilling crops with our new 'one pass' machine. It gave a lovely level bed and germination in an extraordinary 5 days with oilseed rape early last month. You lose so little moisture and organic matter, and leave much more of the intricate life of stable soil untouched. You are meant to get a dip of yield in the first few years as soils recover their structure, and to balance, you spend a lot less time and fossil fuel. That beautiful iridescent carpet of newly emerging crop against the soil looks even more satisfying this year.

GRASS - has been the star this year; our cows have had only grazed grass since April. As our hemisphere turns from the sun, even with an

Indian summer, the sun is less than half its summer zenith, and the grass cannot be as rich as that grown even on a cloudy summer day. It is growing well this autumn, so we take a little less yield and keep our feed stocks safe against a long winter.

COWS - The autumn cows are settling into milking, looking good on the autumn grass. Our own mix of Friesian, Swedish Red and Montbeliard comes into its own now. They are hardy, happy to graze tightly and have feet that can cope with walking a long way on muddy tracks. Our river stone tracks, which I had thought was great for cows' feet because of the rounded stones, seem to be giving a little more lameness as the little pebbles get caught in their cloven hooves. Hey-ho, you keep learning, and we are slowly replacing with old roadstone, that works better for them. The spring cows are settling into a handy mob to clean pastures out to leave for good growth to graze in early February, when they will calve again.

The dairy heifers are exploring the further reaches of the farm as they graze into the 'standing silage' out in far fields. We want to graze them as long as possible. We are slowly improving our fencing to keep the animals in and train them to graze swards right out, rather than eyeing up next door as an easy option. While we want them to be out as long as possible, with our light forage stocks, we also need to bring them in, the youngest ones soonest, to keep them growing over the winter. In the old days, when farmers relied only on hay over the winter, you would 'store' cattle, keep them hungry over the winter, have them mature in 3 not 2 years. 3 year old heifers milk less well, and you've got a lot of time when eg they are producing methane without producing milk, so now we keep them growing through the winter, and have them calve at 2 years old.

CHEESE - The curd - new cheese in the vat, before it is moulded - is coming through feeling lovely. October cheese has a richness that comes from the autumn grass and the spring cows coming to the end of lactation. It is a perfect match for rich autumn and winter dishes. We tasted a good run of last year's October cheese to send of to the US for Thanksgiving and Christmas. The balance and richness of the curd in the vat now, showed up in the rich buttery unfolding flavours of the year old cheese; no one flavour dominating, and layers of flavour revealing themselves long after the cheese has left your mouth. It was lovely to demonstrate cheesemaking to the Craft Guild of Chefs last month, and hear how many of these top chefs really enjoy serving and cooking with our cheese.

RECIPE - Lee Maycock, official chef for 'Star Wars' and the England football team, cooked a wonderful Spelt Risotto with Quikes Traditional Hard Goats Cheese for the Craft Guild, a warming autumn dish. He cooked some chopped onions in butter till translucent, added the pearled spelt in a rich chicken stock until soft (he did it properly, adding 1/3 at a time) until the liquid is almost

absorbed. At the end, he added grated goats cheese, & stirred in green peas just woken up in boiling water. He seasoned it & served with slices of goats cheese on the top. It went very quickly amongst the Craft Guild of Chefs, a lovely dish. Serve with roasted autumn vegetables for a warming and colourful supper.

APPLE DAY - We're celebrating apple orchards, artisan food, and sustainable farming by opening up our farm to local farmers and producers. There will be something for everyone: pig roast, hot cider from the apple press, beer, wine, games for kids, and representation from local farmers, producers, and food organizations, including Slow Food Exeter University and Devon. Come along to **Home Farm on Saturday October 20th, 11am to 4pm**

Vibrant and colourful

I have a mental image of God painting a picture of heaven: standing paintbrush in hand, in front of a vast canvas, a little like Michelangelo but without the beard. The picture is all about people - diverse and varied, vibrant and colourful, and full of surprises. He doesn't 'paint by numbers' and follow rules, but is inspired by creativity and imagination. And he is still painting the picture.

This might seem a big leap, but the Greenbelt Festival which I attended over the recent Bank Holiday weekend - along with around 20,000 other people - reflects something of this picture for me. (Greenbelt is an annual arts, faith and justice festival, rooted in the Christian tradition). Picture for yourself first the glorious panorama through the floor-to-ceiling expanse of glass on the top floor of the grandstand at Cheltenham Racecourse where the Festival is held. A sea of brightly coloured tents is spread before you, each representing people from different walks of life (and with a beautiful backdrop of hills beyond).

The many festival venues complete the scene. Who is that emerging from the Big Top but comedian Frank Skinner, having entertained with his compulsive joke-making whilst bearing his soul, that whilst he never lost his faith in God he only latterly rediscovered his appreciation of the (Catholic) Church. Science is the topic in a huge indoor auditorium nearby, as an eminent retired physicist, John Polkinghorne, looks forward to a world in which he will have to learn the physics all over again because the natural laws of decay in this universe won't apply. Nearby, an original and dramatic presentation of transgender issues in the Bible is enacted; that's Peterson Toscano, a gay Christian who tried for several years to become 'straight', now using his talents in acting and Biblical scholarship to encourage new insights.

A small crowded tent reverberates with the applause for a Nobel Peace Prize nominee and Palestinian presidential candidate; remarkable grace is on display as peacemaker Dr Mustafa Barghouthi tells of the campaign of non-violent protest against the

injustice they endure. Meanwhile, why is that large crowd over there dancing uncontrollably? That will be because The Proclaimers are playing their eternally infectious tune '500 Miles' on the main stage. Away from the noise in a quiet haven, a picture of Christ provides focus for meditation - on who we are and who we can be.

The whole patchwork of people is somehow like a party - people talking, laughing, relaxing - yet also learning and growing together. Even an open-air communion service for thousands of people on the grass and mud is more feeding-of-the-5000 (without the miraculous part) than church-ceremony.

Greenbelt isn't heaven, of course! And harmony is easier to achieve for a weekend than in the messy struggles of daily life. But Greenbelt is inclusive, hospitable and open. Which reflects something deep in God's nature - a Father who embraces all of us, his prodigal children. So God continues with his painting of heaven, working the different colours, the different characters, the different shades of human existence into one beautiful and joyful whole.
